This proposal seeks to increase the capacity of Pen y Cwm special school in light of further demand for special school places. The Education Resources and Planning team along with Inclusion Service wish to increase capacity from 175 (2021) to 205 pupils (September 2026 with further places in 2030/31 to take it up to 250 places). This proposal also seeks to retrospectively acknowledge work undertaken in the existing school as well as the temporary location for Post 16 provision for Pen y Cwm special school based at Vision House, Unit 4, Gwent Court, Victoria Business Park, NP23 8AN.
