Introduction

Welcome to Blaenau Gwent's Annual Scrutiny Report 2023-24 which gives an overview of work undertaken by each Scrutiny Committee.

All Scrutiny Members have effectively challenged and influenced the Council's decision-making process and added value to a wide range of activity, in order to deliver effective outcomes for the people of Blaenau Gwent, some of this work is highlighted in the following sections of this report.

Following changes to the democratic structure in 2022, Blaenau Gwent now has four scrutiny committees that collectively support the work of the Cabinet and Council, and the new structure continues to allow non-Cabinet members to influence how local and strategic policy can work more effectively for the people they serve and effectively challenge Cabinet on the decisions it makes.

The Council's Scrutiny function is made up of non-Cabinet Members. The non-Cabinet Members are appointed to sit on the Scrutiny Committees to support the work of the Cabinet and the Council as a whole.

The Committees have no decision-making powers, however, they act as a check and balance on the powers exercised and decisions taken by the Cabinet.

Introduction (continued)

The Scrutiny Committees allow non-Cabinet Members to have a greater say in Council matters by:

- Assisting the Cabinet in the development of policy;
- Monitoring performance of the Council and its partners;
- Examining the impact and implementation of Cabinet decisions and policies;
- Holding the Leader, Cabinet and Corporate Leadership Team to account;
- Listening to the views of the public and make sure the public voice is heard; and
- Scrutinising external organisations who provide services to our residents.

Scrutiny is most effective when it is focussed on a limited number of in-depth topics and priorities. When considering agenda items, Scrutiny Committees should have regard to the likely value and impact gained for any report or review. This will need to be carefully balanced against the time and resources required to undertake the activity.

Other items of interest or information required to enhance the Members knowledge and skills in a particular area, can be provided to Members via Member Briefing Sessions, Directorate Briefing Sessions and Member Training and Development.

All Scrutiny Meetings are arranged as hybrid meetings, i.e. Committee Members and Officers can attend virtually via Microsoft Teams or physically attend the meeting in the General Offices. Members of the public are also able to attend the meetings either virtually or physically.

All Democratic Meetings are recorded and uploaded onto the Blaenau Gwent website.

Scrutiny in Blaenau Gwent

The four scrutiny committees of the Council are:

- ♦ Corporate Overview and Performance:
- Partnership;
- People; and
- Place.

As agreed at the May 2022 Council Annual General Meeting, each scrutiny committee comprises of 9 Elected Members.

Each scrutiny committee has a specific remit. Full details of the areas covered by each scrutiny committee are highlighted later in this report.

The scrutiny agenda structure has ensured members undertake in-depth challenge for each item under discussion. Council agreed that the number of items on a scrutiny agenda would be reduced to a maximum of two items, under the categories of 'Pre-Decision' and 'Performance Monitoring', this would ensure that the agendas were focussed and support effective decision making. The reduction in the number of items for scrutiny has also ensured that the Cabinet Forward Work Programme is not being overburdened with monitoring items.

Expert witnesses / invitees have been invited and contributed to scrutiny meetings, including the Education Achievement Service (EAS), the Aneurin Leisure Trust (ALT) and the Shared Resource Service (SRS).

Outside of the formal scrutiny committee, members have attended numerous briefing sessions, which have been informative and developed their knowledge and understanding of specific topics.

Chairs and Vice-Chairs of Scrutiny meetings are held to discuss and review the operational activity of Scrutiny in Blaenau Gwent to contribute to improvements and ensure consistency of practice where appropriate.

Directorate briefings are also held quarterly with individual Directorates, to which all Members are invited. These closely focussed sessions provide information and detail on service areas to raise the interest and enthusiasm of Members.

Forward Work Programmes


Work to develop the Forward Work Programmes (FWPs) for 2023-24 began in March 2023, work included:



Scrutiny Forward Work Programme Highlights

Topic: Engagement and Participation Strategy

Activity

A report was presented to the committee on 22nd June 2023. The report provided detail on Member and wider public involvement in the development of a new Engagement and Participation Strategy for the Council. The Committee was asked to agree to a joint Corporate Overview and Performance Scrutiny and Democratic Services Committee workshop on 18th July 2023 to shape the development of the initial strategy.

Outcome

At the workshop members were asked to consider the method and levels of engagement and participation to contribute towards the new strategy and to review the development plan for the policy; to consider how the new strategy will meet the requirements within the Local Government and Elections (Wales) Act 2021 and other statutory obligations; and to review the development of the strategy through staff, public and member engagement Members discussed that it was important that they have a visible presence during engagement in consultations and the importance of these being undertaken in the community rather than expecting the community to visit hubs. Members felt that the Council needs to be proactive in feeding back to the community, letting them know the outcomes of engagement and what is planned and what isn't and the reasons why, if something can't happen.

Members asked that documentation is simplified using easily readable infographics and communications and that learning from past events was undertaken.

The draft strategy was presented to the Committee in January 2024 and the committee agreed that the strategy progress to wider consultation. The final strategy will then be presented to the committee in July 2024.



People Scrutiny Committee Chair's Overview

The People Scrutiny Committee has continued its work to scrutinise and challenge across a wide-ranging work programme, with committee members using skills and experience to put forward recommendations to Cabinet for consideration.

In Children's Services, the Committee has examined critical areas such as The Childcare Offer, National Adoption Service, Corporate Parenting, and work is continuing around the Children's Residential Provision in Blaenau Gwent and committee continues to monitor this work.

In Adult services, the Committee has examined a varied work programme scrutinising reports on critical areas such as, Violence Against Women Domestic Abuse Sexual Violence (VAWDASV) Regional (Gwent) Strategy 2023-2026, Annual Report of the Director of Social Services 2022/23 and the Director of Social Services Quarter 1 and 2 updates, and critical areas such as the Integrated Care Fund and Living Independently.

In Education, the Committee have scrutinised reports and made recommendations to the Cabinet in areas that include home-to-school transport, ALN provision and strategies, Education and safeguarding, schools' admissions policy and the improving schools' programme. Members also continue to monitor recommendations from Estyn and deliberated on an end-of-year report from the Interim Director of Education.

The Committee agreed that both departments have responded well to external audits and developed solid action plans to address any external recommendations received.

- Organise a Members Briefing on the operations and services provided by the Gwent Archives and Gwent Crematoria by end March 2024
- All relevant strategic documents, annual business plan and accounts for Gwent Archives and Gwent Crematoria are included in the Forward Work Programme for the Partnerships Scrutiny Committee for 2024-25, and Council where relevant.
- Develop the Terms of Reference into a 'governance toolkit' for use by officers across the Council for providing assurance against existing companies and in the event of the establishment of any new ones by end March 2024.

Gwent Public Services Board Scrutiny Committee

The Gwent Public Services Board Scrutiny Committee was established in March 2023, to scrutinise the effectiveness of the Regional Public Services Board.

The core statutory functions of the Committee are:

- To review or scrutinise the decisions made, or actions taken by the Board;
- To review or scrutinise the Board's governance arrangements;
- To make reports or recommendations to the Board regarding its functions or governance arrangements;
- To consider matters relating to the Board as the Welsh Ministers may refer to it and report to the Welsh Ministers accordingly; and
- To carry out other functions in relation to the Board that are imposed on it by the Well-Being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015.

In addition to these functions the Committee can also consider:

- The effectiveness of the Wellbeing Assessment;
- The effectiveness of the Wellbeing Plan;
- The effectiveness of performance measurement arrangements;
- The level of commitment from individual partners to the work of the Public Services Board;
- The effectiveness of the Public Services Board in communicating its work, objectives and outcomes to its stakeholders; and
- The effectiveness of the Public Services Board in addressing the issue of pooled funding to tackle priorities.

To enable it to fulfil its scrutiny function the Scrutiny Committee will be provided with evidence in the form of:

- Assessment of local well-being;
- Annual reports; and
- Reporting on joint projects directed by the Regional Public Services Board.

The Committee should recognise that the Wellbeing of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 only allows there to be scrutiny of the 'corporate body' of the PSB, and not the individual members. The legislation states:

"The committee can require any member of the board to give evidence, but only in respect of the exercise of joint functions conferred on them as a member of the board under this Act."

How the public can get involved in the Scrutiny Process

Members of the public are welcome to attend any Committee meeting to observe proceedings (unless there is an exempt item). Committee agendas and papers are published one week in advance of the meeting, on the Council's website. Currently Scrutiny meetings are offered to be held on a hybrid basis with some members being in a meeting room at the General Offices and some attending virtually via Microsoft Teams. All meetings are recorded and uploaded to the council website, normally by the following day, to enable members of the public to view the meetings online. Nevertheless, should a member of the public request to attend the General Offices or via Microsoft Teams to observe a meeting, provisions are be put in place to enable the committee meeting to be observed.

The Council is currently preparing an Engagement and Participation Strategy to include ways in which members of the public can engage in the democratic process. Some common themes received from the public during the consultation were:

- Optimise timing of committee meetings to ensure working people can participate.
- Providing more information about the decision-making process and decisions or outcomes from committee meetings via communications channels.
- Increased opportunities for people to engage directly with councillors, either face-to-face or via online MS Teams or Zoom meetings.
- Encourage people to participate in local democracy, with 80-90% of respondents wanting to see 'more' opportunities to find out how the Council works and attend, watch, speak or submit questions to Committee meetings.
- Some interest in learning more about the role of a County Borough Councillor and how to become one in future.
- Work will be undertaken throughout the 2024/25 cycle to embed some of the consultation themes more effectively into the democratic process.

Legislation

Local Government and Elections (Wales) Act

The Local Government and Elections (Wales) Act 2021 contains a number of provisions to promote diversity, involvement and -participation in council democratic arrangements. Some of these provisions include:

- Encouraging local people to participate in decision making:
- Development of a Participation Strategy:
- The electronic broadcasting of meetings and multi-location meetings;
- Develop a multi-location meeting policy;
- A review of the council's petition scheme; and
- Opportunities for job sharing for members of the Cabinet.

Well-being of Future Generations (WBFG) Act

The Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 requires public bodies to carry out sustainable development - the process of improving the economic, social, environmental and cultural well-being of Wales, ensuring that all our service areas are giving it due consideration so that the services we provide meet the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to do the same. Blaenau Gwent County Borough Council as a designated public body under the WBFG Act, therefore, has a duty to ensure it is giving due consideration to the act.

The Council's corporate reporting template requires officers to consider how the report topic supports the WBFG Act.

This led to a new Integrated Impact Assessment (IIA) process -being developed which incorporated wider policy considerations beyond equality and socio-economics such as:

- Well-being of Future Generation Act Goals;
- New Corporate Objectives;
- Armed forces (new national duties); and
- Community Safety considerations.

The Policy Team continues to provide on-going support, advice and guidance to those completing the IIA process.

Integrated Impact Assessment (IIA)

As a defined public body in Wales, the Council must fulfil a specific duty for the assessment of impact. This relates to the likely impact of any new or existing (when reviewed) policies or practices. There is a key focus when assessing impact on the ability to meet the Council's three general duties under the Act, including assessing any positive or negative impact on groups covered by the nine protected characteristics.

Where it has been deemed there is a substantial (or likely) negative impact the Council must report this, accordingly, outlining any decisions taken with any mitigations considered/actioned.

A review of the way the Council carries out impact assessments was undertaken in 2021/22. This fell in-line with new legal expectations from the Act, the Socio-Economic Duty.

The process was also strengthened to ensure all equality and socio-economic factors were fully considered when making decisions, reviewing existing or developing new policies. The requirement to carry out and report on impact assessing continued to be expected in corporate reporting templates for decision making.

Future Planned Developments

- Implementation of the democratic aspects of the Participation and Engagement Strategy to support how members of the public can engage in the democratic process.
- Live broadcasting of full Council meetings will commence within the 2024/25 cycle.
- Identifying how young people can actively engage in the democratic process
- Involving the Chair and Vice Chair of Governance and Audit Committee and Democratic Services Committee in the remit of the Scrutiny Chairs and Vice Chairs Terms of Reference when agenda items relate to chairing and skills.
- As agreed by Council, following a recommendation from Corporate and Performance Scrutiny Committee, a pilot will commence holding meetings later in the day in order to increase participation in the process.
